**Special and Differential Treatment and Sustainability
Criteria for Fisheries and the Chairs Text**

Special and Differential Treatment- topic that would be addressed on the session of the Group of Rules a day after this workshop-is one of the key issues during the negotiations of Fisheries Subsidies within WTO. During these negotiations-issues related to sustainability and free trade will also come out. What should be the limits and conditions of special and differential treatment that developing countries can compromise in order to give the economic incentives needed, without causing overfishing and unfair south-south competition? The Text of the President of November 2007, is a starting point, however, it does not provide all the answers. The 2007 UNEP-WWF publication *Sustainability Criteria for Fisheries Subsidies: Options for the WTO and Beyond* will be compared with the Text of the President and a follow up of the discussions at a regional level that took place during the UNEP-WWF workshop (in collaboration of CPPS and the Government of Ecuador) in Guayaquil on July 2009.
